#### **Beekeeping Update**

On Sunday, March 7th, we had our first meeting for the beekeeping project. We are planning to install two new hives of Italian and Carneolan bees at the farm sometime in April to replace the hives we lost last winter. Besides talking about bees and beekeeping, we watched a worker bee collecting pollen from our ceanothus bush in our garden. If you look closely at the bees' legs, you can really see yellow balls of pollen clinging to the hairs. This might seem like a foolish idea, but bees don't sting unless they get scared. If you move slowly and don't get too close, it's easy to observe bees without getting stung.

My parents have discovered two "bee trees" in the neighborhood, one of which is very near the farm, and we watched a video my dad took of the trees. Dozens of busy bees were coming and going from holes in the trunks! We also compared the flavor of our delicious 4-H honey to the commercial honey from the grocery store. Did you know that nectar from different flowers makes different flavors of honey? With all of the warm weather we've been having lately, if you go out in your yard, I bet you'll bees collecting nectar and pollen from your flowering bushes and trees. Take a look!
