Spring Farm Clean-up

Saturday, April 26 9 am to noon

All 4-Hers are encouraged to participate in our Spring farm clean-up. We have many jobs to do, especially after the winter rains, and the farm needs everyone, including parents! This is a mandatory event for every member who is in a farm animal project: goats, sheep, pigs, poultry (chickens and turkeys), and bee-keeping. Attendance will be taken. If you have an excused absence, as defined in the Club attendance policy, please inform your project leader and Eric Grimsby, the Farm Boss, and you will be assigned make-up farm work.

Bring gloves, disposable dust masks, etc. This is also a fun club event, which you may enter in your record book as "attended event". Hot chocolate, juice, coffee, and doughnuts will be provided.

Mandatory Pre-Fair Meeting

The San Mateo County Fair has published the schedule for the mandatory prefair meeting. If you intend to show any animal at the fair, you must attend a meeting at the fairgrounds either Saturday, May 10 at 10 am or Wednesday, May 14 at 6:30 pm.

This year you are required to attend one of the meetings if you are showing an animal *even if* the animal will not be staying at the fair. Are you bringing a cavy for a day show? Showing your dog? Exhibiting a rabbit? All market animal exhibitors *and* show animal participants must attend one of these meetings. Mark your calendar now!

P.S. Rumor is that there will be a uniform exchange at the meetings.

Uniform Check-up: Do You Have All the Pieces?

Do you need to get a 4-H uniform? Uniforms are only required if you are showing an animal at fair. You are not *required* to wear a uniform at any other 4-H event, but we like having some members in uniform at Hometown Days and other events.

We will have the club's current supply of small uniform pieces and club t-shirts at the March meeting. Read below the description of the complete uniform. Note the prices for the small items that may be purchased through the club and where you can go to get your "whites". Bring cash for your club purchases or remind your parents to bring their checkbooks. Also, remember to bring your old, clean whites to the meeting or up to the farm to be recycled. The upcoming farm clean-up will be the perfect time!

San Carlos-Eaton Hills 4-H Uniform Regulations: General Requirements:

- Uniforms are only required if you are showing an animal at fair.
- You are not required to wear a uniform at any 4-H event.

Bottoms:

• White canvas pants or white jeans (jeans recommended if showing an animal).
Pants are available at Western Saddlery (650) 345-2261; 206 E Hillsdale Blvd,
San Mateo (near intersection with 101.) Some sizes need to be ordered in advance; check by calling the store.

We have a good selection of hand-me-down pants at the farm. Check 'em out!

- Brown or black belt with matching shoes.
- White shorts or skirts are optional for girls not exhibiting animals.

Shirt:

- White.
- Long-sleeved. (Short sleeves OK if not showing an animal.)
- Collared.
- Must be worn tucked in.

You can find shirts at department stores (boy's department) and thrift shops, and also check out the hand-me-downs at the farm.

Most girls wear boys' shirts.

Tie or Scarf:

- Must be the official 4-H tie or scarf.
- Girls wear scarf or tie.
- Boys wear tie.

- Must be the official 4-H hat.

Accolades go to the Poultry Judging and Avian Bowl teams that attended this year's Greater California Society of Poultry Fanciers annual show, held February 23 at the Fresno County Fairgrounds. Arranged through the cooperation of Modesto Junior College and UC Davis, this poultry judging contest challenged the kids, exposed them to new methods of reasoning, and forced them to think on their feet. All of our members did well and deserve congratulations!

In the five-part poultry judging contest, members had to grade eggs (both in the shell and broken out), grade whole chicken carcasses, identify commercial cuts of chicken, and finally place four live laying hens in order of their egg productivity. All contestants presented oral reasons for their placings.

Kate Ortiz gave proud representation as a senior team of one! Please congratulate Kate on her individual achievement. The junior team, comprised of Elena Wyckoff, Peri Wong, and Allison Kostecki (Lamorinda 4-H) placed first in juniors. All three junior team members also won individual medals in the sub-group of Past Layer Production.

Kate Lyn's Report


