

Registration Reminders

All Parents: Please consider becoming a registered volunteer. Registered adult volunteers receive liability protection for all 4-H sponsored events (such as driving for field trips, visiting the farm, etc.), and help ensure the safety of all our children.

Farm Parents: If your child plans to have an animal at the farm this spring, we strongly encourage you to register as an Adult Resource Leader. No child may be at the farm unless accompanied by at least one officially registered adult. That means that you and your child may not be alone at the farm (for a morning feeding, etc.), unless you are registered with 4-H. Take care of this important requirement before the spring animals appear!

All New and Returning Members: Registration closes at the end of December. Please submit those forms and checks back as soon as possible. Please register online, and then give me a printed medical form and a \$45 check.

Medical Form Reminder

Parents: Please remember to provide each of your child's project leaders with a separate completed medical form by the first project meeting. Forms can be found on our website www.sancarlos4h.org. (Look for the link at the top of the home page.) Be sure to discuss with the project leader any information that may impact your child's participation in project activities.

Project Leaders: Do not allow parents to drop off their child at your first meeting unless you have a completed and signed medical form in hand. You can print the forms from our website www.sancarlos4h.org. (Look for the link at the top of the home page.) Have some extra forms for parents to fill out. Look over the completed forms and discuss with parents any matter of concern (allergies, etc.) Keep a complete set of the forms with you at all project meetings.

Mandatory Meeting for Members Raising Farm Animals

Members who plan to raise a market animal (chickens, turkeys, goats, sheep and pigs) at the club's farm this 4-H year and their parent(s) must attend a farm families meeting on **Tuesday, December 1, 2009** at 7 pm in the Clifford School Library. This meeting is very important for the successful operation of the farm and a successful and enjoyable county fair experience for all of our junior livestock exhibitors and their families. We will be reviewing members' animal project responsibilities at the farm and at the fair, as well as parents' roles and responsibilities. In addition, the farm animal project leaders will speak briefly about their plans for their projects.

Members who cannot attend the December 1 meeting must contact Farm Manager Janae Novotny to schedule a make-up meeting. A member and parent(s)' attendance at the December 1 meeting or a make-up meeting with the Farm Manager and/or Farm Boss is required before a member's farm use request will be considered for approval.

Please remember that all farm use requests must be turned into Farm Boss, Eric Grimsby, or Farm Manager, Janae Novotny, before this meeting.

All members and parents who are interested in learning more about what is involved in raising a market animal and exhibiting the animal at the county fair are encouraged to attend the December 1 meeting, too.

Want to Go to CAL (Creating a Leader Conference)?

4-H members in 7th grade and up are invited to register for the North Central Division Creating a Leader Conference at Walker Creek Ranch, Petaluma. It will be held from January 22-24, 2010. The North Central division includes Sonoma, Marin, San Mateo, San Francisco, Santa Clara, Alameda, Contra Costa, Solano, Napa, Yolo, Sacramento, San Joaquin, Calaveras, Amador, and El Dorado counties. The cost is \$75 per person; last year the cost was \$140.

Registration materials are available in the county 4-H office. The registration deadline is November 27, 2009. For details, contact Maeve and Bruce Knoth. Each county in the North Central Section is allotted 15 delegate spaces. If there are more who wish to attend, the county may wait-list up to 5 applicants.

Successful leadership is best learned in two ways: by observing it in others and by trying it oneself. The CAL Leadership Team is composed of former delegates who are now in charge of planning and delivering the Conference. The overall focus of CAL Conference is to

provide a platform for youth leaders to share their joy, knowledge, and enthusiasm with their peers. The educational focus of CAL Conference is for delegates to enhance their techniques to demonstrate leadership in how they behave, in their attitudes, and in the words they choose to use.

YOUR CHANCE TO EARN SOME PINS FOR YOUR HAT!

Proficiency Tests are coming the the San Carlos Eaton Hills November meeting. Have you learned something about rabbits? Lambs? Chickens? Cavies? Goats? Steer? At the close of our General Meeting on November 17 you will have a chance to take county-wide animal proficiency tests. These are fill-in-the-blank, and true/false tests that give you a chance to show off your knowledge about animal care and anatomy. You might plan to take a test or two just for practice so next time we have proficiency testing you will know what to study. There are many 4H proficiency tests online (check the county and state links or just "Google" 4-H proficiency tests) if you want to prepare before the meeting. Good luck.

2009 ARBA National Convention "The Endless Summer"

This past week, Oct. 30 - Nov. 5th, I was in San Diego for an ARBA National Rabbit Convention at the Del Mar Fairgrounds. Early Friday morning, I woke up and rode down to San Diego with my friend Courtney Collins from Pacifica 4-H. When we first got there, late at night, we checked in all of Courtney's rabbits and her friend Susan's guinea pigs. There were over 3,000 rabbits in the youth section and even more in open. Then there were all the exhibition animals and the guinea pigs. It wasn't as loud as a poultry show, which is what I'm used to because rabbits aren't as noisy as chickens. Saturday was the youth competition day. There were events like Breed ID, Royalty and individual or team judging. Everyone had a Rabbit Standard of Perfection because you needed it to judge the rabbits by. The second half of the royalty competition was an interview contest which would help pick the final winners for lady, duke, prince, princess, king and gueen. Courtney taught me how to judge a group of Himalayans because that is what she shows. I started out judging the black ones, then the blue ones and went for breed. I got a senior black doe for Best of Breed and a senior black buck for Best Opposite. Sunday was the first show day. Courtney, Susan and I got up early to go prepare Courtney's rabbits and watch the other breeds be shown after we were done with all Courtney's Himalayans, we realized that the Himalayan show wasn't until the next day. I watched the Havana show and I learned a lot from listening to the judge when she spoke about her placements and reasons. After I watched the show, I went to a Havana social for the Havana Club and met other people who raise Havanas. Finally, it's Monday and we start off the day early again to clean the rabbits, again. Neither Courtney nor Susan had anything they had to do at the show on Tuesday, so we took that day off and were complete tourists. Wednesday started out with a Havana Club meeting. I woke up early and rode to the fairgrounds with my boyfriend, Patrick and his mom and sister. After the meeting, there was a Havana auction where they sold Havanas. I was looking for a rabbit, but I only had \$80, which wasn't enough seeing

that the rabbits I bid on all went for over \$100. One doe sold for \$290. Instead, I bought a broken blue doe and bred her to a black buck. After the auction I went to a banquet and then to the beach. Later that evening was the youth banquet and dance. The awards for national husbandry and royalty were announced there and the rest of the night was spent dancing. The next day was checkout day. It was sad to leave San Diego, but I was anxious to get home and show my family my new rabbit. Her babies are due early December and they will be anywhere from solid blue and black to broken if anybody is interested.
