This month's activity is cookie judging where members can bake a batch of cookies and have the other members try them and critique them. As a past best cookie winner here are my tips for making the perfect cookie:


<u>Decoration</u>: Make them look pretty. Different colored frosting, sprinkles, powdered sugar, all make your cookies look more appealing and make people want to eat them. The more people that eat your cookies, the more potential votes you can get.

<u>Texture</u>: Soft cookies and hard cookies alike have won in the past but the trick is having the right texture for the thickness of your cookie. If you want a crunchy cookie its best to make it thin because no one wants to break a tooth on a cookie that's the size and texture of a hockey puck.

<u>Taste</u>: be creative and make it memorable. A really good chocolate chip cookie could win but you'll have a better chance if you give people something they've never had before. Try adding some rhubarb to the batter or drizzling some honey on top of your cookie. Just one ingredient that people didn't expect can really make your cookie stand out.

Manga Art Project

This past meeting, the members spent time working on their Final Group Projects that will be entered as a feature booth in the San Mateo County Fair in June. The members are either working in small groups or solo on their portion of the manga. "Manga" is Japanese comic books, where the dialogue is read from right to left, the opposite of English.

In our group manga, the basis of the story is this:

Two siblings, Kat and JJ, are sucked into the video game realm after the power shuts off while they are playing video games. To find their way back into the real world, they must beat every game that JJ owns. Unfortunately, JJ is a bit of a collector.

Each member/group is working on one "video game" that is a part of JJ's collection. The individual stories will come together into one big comic.

While the members were busily working on their projects, I over-heard a lot of interesting ideas. The basic premise of their individual episodes of the group manga is that a competition must occur in a virtual realm. One group is recreating the popular phone app game, "Flappy Bird," while another is working with the much older game, "Duck Hunt." Their "video game" does not have to be based on an actual video game, so other groups are creating cooking competitions, mind puzzles, and even a fighting game where the characters battle aliens to make it to the next round.

Veterinary Science

For our March Veterinary Science meeting the theme was birds so the vet we work with, Dr. Amezcua, taught us how to catch and hold her ducks and geese. In case you're wondering, you catch a duck by cornering it in its cage and grabbing its neck. Their necks are very strong so there is almost no chance that you'll hurt them. Then you stick your other hand under the duck and lift it up so that its back is against your chest. It's very important to keep your hands and arms away from its feet because they have some pretty sharp nails. It's also important to hold its wings down, especially with a goose because having them hit you in the face with their very long wings isn't fun. After we caught them we took them into the clinic where we weighed them. It's pretty hard to get ducks and geese to stand still on a scale so for the smaller ducks we put them in a paper bag and closed the top (don't worry, they could still breathe). With some of the bigger ducks and the geese we had to wrap them in a towel to make sure they didn't fly or run away. I've been in the vet science project for about 7 years and I still learn something new every time I go. ~-Jesse

At the last 4-H SET project meeting, we built mini catapults. We built them out of popsicle sticks, rubber bands, and bottle caps.
