Advanced STEM (Must have passed Algebra 1)

Thinking of a career in science? In this project we will develop a higher understanding of the science and engineering fields through experimentation and mathematics.



Automotive (Ages 13 and older)

Do you plan to own a car some day? This is the project for you. We will do safety checks, change tires, get our hands dirty, and generally learn about automotive maintenance.

Beekeeping (All ages)

Beekeeping is back! Learn all about bees and beekeeping, look inside an active beehive, and harvest honey.

Hiking and Wildflowers (All ages. Chaperone required for ages 5-7)


We will learn about the Flora (plant life), fauna (animals) & fungus in our "neighborhood backyard," enter a group educational display at the San Mateo County Fair, and encourage participants to enter their own project based on our project experience. All of our hikes will be two to three miles long and will take place near San Carlos. We will also be going on a docent-led tour of Filoli.

Hometown Days Parade Project (All ages)

In this project, members will plan and prepare for our club's entry into the Hometown Days parade. Will we have a float? Costumes? Animals? Join the project and help decide!

Letterboxing (All ages)

What is letterboxing? Hiding small, weatherproof boxes in publicly accessible places (like parks) and distributing clues to finding the box on one of several web sites. Individual letterboxes contain a small notebook and a hand carved rubber stamp. Finders make an imprint of the letterbox's stamp in their personal notebook, and leave an impression of their own handmade signature stamp in the letterbox's "visitors' book" or "logbook" — as proof of having found the box and letting other letterboxers know



who has visited. In this project, kids will design and carve their own rubber stamp, find letterboxes, keep a record of stamps and nature findings on their hikes, and create, hide and list a SCEH 4-H letterbox stamp or two.

Urban Escapes (All ages)


San Francisco's Chinatown? The merry-go-round at Yerba Buena Gardens? The murals in the Mission District? The glass elevator at the St. Francis Hotel? Where do you want to go by public transportation? In this project we will study maps and timetables and plan two excursions. We will figure out all the logistics including schedules, transfers and fares before heading out in the world for our adventures. Parents will join us on these trips.

Day of the Horse

This weekend Tia and I went to the Day of the Horse in Woodside. We got to ride in the Wells Fargo Stage coach and learned about horse organizations. There was a petting zoo with a mini pot belly pig and chickens. We got to decorate a horse cookie with sprinkles and frosting. We got to listen to the heartbeat of a horse. It was very, very slow at 30 beats per minute. A horse's heartbeat can reach up to 300 beats per minute if running as fast as it can. We helped out at Amy's booth, Gallop Ventures. Amy is our club's horse project leader. Last year I was in the project and learned a lot about horses. I'm glad I went to the day of the horse. --Quincy Thuener





Over the weekend, October 10, Quincy and I volunteered at the Day of the Horse event in Woodside. We helped at the Gallop Ventures information booth for our horse project leader, Ms. Amy. We were there to help tell people what the horse project was about. We got to listen to a horse's heartbeat. A horse's heart beats are low pitched and slow (20-30 beats

per minute). We got to sit on a horse without a saddle on and got our pictures taken. We got to decorate horse-shaped sugar cookies. We rode on the Wells Fargo Stage coach and got to play with the chickens, mini pot-belly pigs and rabbits at the Redwood City 4-H petting farm. I really liked this fair and would definitely do it again. --Tia Chan

What goes in a record book?

- There's a little section about You.
- There's information about your projects; what did you do at each meeting? (we learned about rabbit anatomy, we learned how to hold a bow, we learned how to decorate cupcakes)
- There's information you enter about club meetings (we had a gift exchange, we played bingo)
- There's information about other 4-H events you attend (Farm clean-up day, selling Pen Pride tickets at the County Fair)
- There's information about your citizenship (*I participated* in the club food drive)
- There's information about your communication skills (*I wrote a newsletter article, I gave a presentation*)
- There's information about activities outside of 4-H (community service for school or church)
- There's a record of awards (I got a blue ribbon at the Fair for cupcake decorating and a red for a photograph)

Important Attendance Policy Reminder

San Carlos-Eaton Hills 4-H Club Attendance Policy

• Eighty percent attendance at the club's monthly general meetings and 80 percent attendance at the project meetings are needed to exhibit any project at the San Mateo County Fair. Eighty percent attendance at the club's monthly general meetings is

required to obtain a star rank. Eighty percent attendance at project meetings is required to earn record book credit for each project.

- An excused absence will not count against the 80 percent calculation.
- Excused absences include illness, religious commitments, or mandatory school activities (one-time meeting, school play, or concert). Other excuses may be presented to the Steering Committee for authorization.
- Bring a note to the club secretary the month before or after your excused absence so it can be recorded.
- Homework and school social activities are examples of non-excused absences.
- If you will have to leave early or arrive late on a regular basis, please provide a note of explanation to the club secretary. You can still receive credit for attendance, but more than two late arrivals or early departures will disqualify you from earning a 100 percent participation pin.
- You are responsible to find out what you missed at the general meetings.
- You are encouraged to make up the missed meeting with community service time: volunteering at schools or special-needs programs, or representing the club at Lions Club activities, Hometown Days, and the San Mateo County Fair (auction, cake booth, Redwood Hall attendant or Pen Pride).
