2016 National Youth Healthy Living Summit, Washington, D.C.

On the weekend of February 12-15, I attended and was a guest speaker at the 2016 National Youth Healthy Living Summit in Washington, D.C. As a California 4-H State Ambassador, I had developed a workshop on stress relief for teens and I was invited to present this workshop at the summit. The conference, held at the National 4-H Conference Center in Maryland, was attended by approximately 275 teens from around the country. There were over 90 participants who attended my

workshop. I provided information about causes of stress, symptoms of stress, and gave suggestions for a variety of stress relief strategies ranging from adult coloring books to customized spotify playlists.

When I was not presenting my workshops, I attended informational sessions on meditation, healthy relationships, and calcium's nutritional value. I met many teens from around the United States who all shared an interest in the healthy living 4-H mandate. I now have new friends from Chicago, Tennessee and Georgia! During the conference it snowed heavily and all of the Californians were extremely



excited. We spent time playing in the snow and making snow cream—snow mixed with milk, vanilla, and sugar which is a popular treat in the South. We also took a night time tour of the Washington Monuments in sub freezing temperatures! 


Poultry Show, Goat Project and Presentation Day

Science, Engineering and Technology

On February 20, 2016, the SET Project met up at the library to start learning about Rube Goldberg machines. If you're wondering what a Rube Goldberg machine is, it is a complicated machine to do very simple thing, perhaps such as ring a doorbell, turn on a computer, or even brushing your teeth. You can make your own Rube Goldberg machine to pop a balloon, which we did at the SET Project. At the Rube Goldberg SET Project I was grouped with Adrian, and Logan to make our own Rube Goldberg machine. We first gathered a pegboard, a few wooden slats, 2 or 3 HotWheel tracks, and pegs to put into the pegboards. We first inserted the pegs into the pegboard where we wanted the first track to go. We then placed a piece on top of the pegs to create a track. We kept doing that process down the board. We also used paper towel rolls, plastic pipe in the shape of an elbow, which the ball could go through, and then land onto another track. After we built the machines, we held a contest to see which teams had a machine that could pop a balloon. Wildflower Hiking

On Saturday, February 27, our wildflower hiking group was delighted to be able to go on a docent lead tour of Filoli, a historical property with hiking trails on it. We saw all kinds of wildlife, for example, we saw turkeys, deer, newts and tunnel spiders. We also found some coyote scat, and our



guide, Tom Davids, cut it open to show us how much you can learn about the animal whose it was. Towards the end of the trail there

were the bones of a long gone deer, probably eaten by a bobcat or coyote. There are three main species of wildflowers that are extremely prosperous in the park. They are referred to at the park as the "red, white and blue". They are indian warrior (red), milkmaids (white), and hound's tongue (blue). Among those flowers we also saw giant trillium, goose grass and miners' lettuce.

Besides the flora and the fauna we also got to learn about the property itself. There are caretakers' quarters a little ways into the wooded area and a humongous house on the

property. The property was originally owned by by a family with the last name of Bourn. The house has 43 rooms and 17 bathrooms as well as a pool and extensive gardens. On the

property there is a cemetery belonging to the Bourns still with six graves. --Nora Schembri
