

Arlo Goes to the Vet

In March, I took my market goat, Arlo, to UC Davis because he was limping. When I had purchased him, the breeder said he had pulled a muscle when she was giving him a vaccination. Arlo was still limping after 2 weeks so I thought there might be something more wrong with his leg than a pulled muscle.

Our drive to UC Davis was long but when we got there, a Vet student met us and took us to the Large Animal Clinic examination room. She examined Arlo's leg and then called in the resident Veterinarian to also examine his leg. Both of them were very careful, as they didn't want to hurt him more. As they were looking over Arlo's leg, they asked lots of questions about what we had done to help his lea up until that point, if he had gotten any better, and also general questions about 4-H and our farm. I explained that I had been icing his leg for two weeks and that I noticed he had been putting more weight on his leg.



They recommended x-rays to see if the leg was broken. The Vet students moved us into a separate building and explained how they would be taking the x-rays. From behind a wall that protected us from the radiation, we saw one student holding Arlo so he wouldn't move in the process, another student holding a screen that would capture the image, and a final student holding something that looked like a really big flashlight. After many attempts, they finally got a good image of his leg. They brought us into a another area where the Vet student showed us




where Arlo's injury was. On a large tv screen hanging on the wall, he pointed out that Arlo had a small bone chip and most likely also a torn ligament. One of the vet students used a horse skeleton next to the tv to indicate exactly where his bone had chipped, and possibly how it had happened. We were taken back to the exam room again, and the vet students gathered lots of supplies to wrap his leg with. One student held Arlo so he wouldn't fall over or try to run away while they were bandaging his leg. Another student wrapped a thick padding around his injured leg so he

couldn't move it while it was healing. Next, they went over the bandage with a bright blue bandaging tape. Finally, they duct taped the bottom of his cast, where his hoof is, to make sure no water got into it while he was walking around. When they were finished, they let him go to see if he could stand on his own. He immediately fell into me because he wasn't used to walking around with the cast, and then he laid down until we were ready to go. Just before we left, the vet gave us some medication to give to Arlo for the pain.



Six days later, we took the cast off and saw that his muscles had shrunk significantly since he wasn't walking or putting any weight on his leg. Arlo still limps a little bit and the Vet says that a ligament tear takes a long time to heal, but he is doing great, gaining strength and he is very happy to play with his pen mates Brian and Phil. I learned a lot from my experience taking my goat to UC Davis and I really enjoyed meeting the Veterinarians and students. They were so kind and caring and took great care of my goat, and I cannot thank them enough.


Dog Project
