So You Plan to Show at Fair








Computer Programming Project

This Saturday, 12/3, we had our second programming project meeting (although I wasn't there for the first one). There, we reviewed what we did last time, then went on to work on new things. We recapped the three most important types of code in programming: loops, or repetition, variables, symbols that stand for a value and are subject to change, and conditionals, or code that act differently based on certain data. This time, we were using conditionals as we created mazes with Scratch, a programming language. We could design the maze and the character however we wanted, but the concept was the same. You





would try to get the character to the end, but if you touched a wall, then you would be sent back to the start. This uses conditionals because the walls would be a different color than everything else, so if you touched that color, it would activate the code to send you back to the start. I



enjoyed creating the maze, and I continued working on it, creating more levels. --Adrian Spinali
