


only, please) will inform them about our Club's programs and activities, and we will try to answer all their questions about 4-H. For more information, call Linda Wacha at (650) 245-0318.

## It's Time to Register Again



Returning youth members and adult leaders *must* re-register for 4-H *immediately*. Fees for youth members will be \$70.00 per child, with no fee for adult leaders. Please bring your fees (check or cash only) to the SEPTEMBER GENERAL MEETING so we can complete this task immediately. Please note that health forms are now online, so if you have completed them online you do not need to bring a copy to the meeting. We encourage all 4-H parents to register as volunteers. Registered adult volunteers receive liability protection for all 4-H sponsored events (such as driving for field trips and visiting the farm).

The 4-H fee covers State and County dues, insurance for 4-H members at 4-H events, and insurance and fees for parent volunteers. Once these expenses have been

covered, the rest is used by our club to pay for food and supplies for meetings and special events.

You can learn more about our budget at the October general meeting when the club members approve the budget for the coming year. All returning members must be fully registered and paid by October 31, 2017, to be considered "in good standing" for the 2018 San Mateo County Fair. Got questions? ## Former San Carlos Eaton Hills 4-H Member Awarded 4-H Diamond Clover Award






## **Member Reports**

### More Fun with Chickens



Hi there! Our names are Peyton, Tia, and Quincy. We call ourselves the 3 Chicks. We started a project this summer, raising showmanship ready bantam chickens for purchase. What are bantam chickens? They are smaller chickens, about ½ the size of a standard sized chicken (2 lbs vs 6 - 8 lbs). We train the chickens on a daily basis by going through the steps of showmanship so that the chickens are easy to handle. These chickens will be ready if you want to take them to the San Mateo County Fair.

What is poultry showmanship? Poultry showmanship is a youth competition where youth get to demonstrate their

knowledge about poultry and how well they handle their chicken in front of a judge. Bantam chickens are easier to show because of their size. This year we are raising Silver Sebrights, Porcelain d'Uccles, and Black Tailed Buff Japanese bantams. These are all bantam breeds.
