President's Message

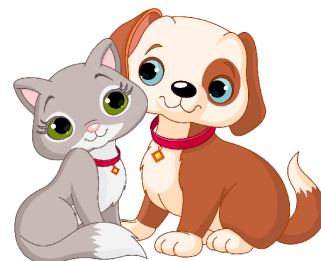
Happy New Year 4-Hers!

At the Intermediate Cooking project on Jan. 8, we made pot stickers, a soup, and fried rice. We all bought the ingredients and planned the dishes at the grocery store. Then we took them back to the Gische's home to cook. During this meeting, I learned how to fully plan a meal and how to mince foods more easily. On the afternoon of January 7th, I attended the my second Intermediate Cooking Session. The meeting was held at Lunardi's and the project leaders house. Last meeting, we made a lot of different foods with pumpkin. This meeting we got to get into groups and pick whatever meal we wanted to make. We decided on a Seven Treasure soup with meatballs and wontons. The other group decided to make fried rice with chicken. In my group we each had \$10, so we had \$50 in total to buy the ingredients for our meal. We ended up buying 13 items. For a vegetable we got Bok Choy. To flavor the soup we bought green onion, garlic, cilantro, ginger, and carrots. For the meatballs and wontons we had ground pork in a bowl with cabbage, ginger, and a little bit of onion. To make the meatballs we used the mixture and rolled them into about 20 meatballs. For the wontons, we hand folded the wrappers. To make them we had a small bowl of whipped egg yolk, and made a ring around the outside of the wrappers. Then we put a spoonful of the meat mixture in the center, to close it we folded it in half like a taco and pinched it on the dome in 3 different places so it wouldn't come undone. The food was really fun to make and eat. Next time, I think that we should buy less food, because we had a lot leftover ingredients and the other group paid \$7 less than us.
