Monthly Health Tips and Medical Miracles January - Why Natural is Not Inherently Better

For Adults

Natural is better, right? Well, not really. Nature is undeniably important for medicines, food, resources, etc. Many compounds used in medicine are naturally occurring, sometimes even toxins, in small doses so they cause minimal side effects and create the most benefit. However, by determining the active compound in nature which creates a desired effect, dosing can be better controlled. This is because natural substances, such as plants, can vary in the amount of medicine in them depending on many factors. Thus, dosing is more difficult. This is why synthetic medicines are preferred to natural ones. Okay, so herbs are not as good as drugs. But what about flavouring. Natural surely is better, right? Well, somewhat. Take vanilla, for example. Vanilla flavour mostly comes from vanillin, and most people can't tell the difference. However, some vanilla flavour comes from other compounds, adding subtle hints. This is true for many other flavours. So, you probably won't notice the difference between artificial and natural flavours. But, if you want the full taste of the natural substance, go for it. Lastly, while many of us think about artificial substances causing more harm than natural ones, both humans and nature create poisons. Many diseases we no longer see due to modern medicine, but still are rampant in developing nations, are caused by nature, such as malaria, cholera, typhoid fever, polio, and

measles, among others. Sure, humans can create horrible poisons such as hexavalent chromium, Monomethylhydrazine, Neonicotinoids, and many others, but nature is not an angel.
