Monthly Health Tips

February - The Wuhan Coronavirus: Don't Panic, but Protect Yourself

For Adults

In December 2019, a new virus was reported in Wuhan Province, China. It is a coronavirus. Coronaviruses usually only cause minor illnesses, such as the common cold, but in some cases, infections can be more serious, such as severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS), Middle East respiratory syndrome (MERS), and now Wuhan coronavirus. Both SARS and MERS are from bats, but the source of Wuhan coronavirus is unclear, but can be spread from person to person. Most cases have been in China, but the virus has spread to other nations, including the U.S., prompting the World Health Organization (WHO) to declare a public health emergency of international concern on Thursday, the 30th of January. The first case was reported the next day in the U.S., and it now has infected seven people. Before panicking, what may be considered is that outbreaks can be contained, which requires your cooperation. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) advises to sanitize or wash hands frequently, cover mouths while coughing and sneezing, go to a physician if you have a fever, cough, and difficulty breathing, avoid contact with animals in markets where the virus is reported, and avoid raw food and prepare food properly. Also note that, while concerning, the media makes money through selling the media, and will happily fear-monger the public. Lastly, the CDC says that Americans are unlikely to come into contact with the virus, so just don't travel to China to be safe.

For Kids

In December 2019, a new germ was reported in China. It is a coronavirus. Coronaviruses usually only cause minor sickness, such as a cold. The Wuhan coronavirus is more severe, but like the cold, can be spread from person to person. The World Health Organization (WHO) has declared a public health emergency of international concern on Thursday, the 30th of January, because the virus has spread to other countries. Before worrying a lot, remember the germ can be stopped from spreading, and to do that, your help is needed. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) advises to wash hands, cover mouths, and see a doctor if you get sick. Also remember that, while worrying, the news makes money through selling the newspapers and getting you to watch their shows, and will happily make people afraid to sell more. Lastly, the CDC says that Americans are unlikely to come into contact with the germ, so just don't travel to China to be safe.
