Please bring a new unwrapped present for a young child or teen to the November meeting. Some items the St. Francis Center would especially like are:


For younger children:




Make a Holiday Card at the November Meeting

Farm Clean Up

In October many 4-H members helped clean up the 4-H Farm in Eaton Hills. We helped build a retaining wall behind the new goat pen. My big bro, Asher, carried about 800 pounds of cement mix to the cement mixer! Logs and other debris were hauled away, the "Knoth Knoll" planting area was spruced up and new compost was added in from our own

compost area. (Did you know that our compost won a ribbon at the County Fair?) There will be more ways to help out at the farm in the future so watch for information in emails and our newsletter. Farm clean up days are really fun and everyone, young and old, is included in the work...even if you can't carry 80 pound bags of cement! --Alex Becker

At our first unofficial Market Poultry Meeting, we cleaned up the farm. The goat barn was torn down, and so we cut it up into pieces and carried it to a dumpster. It was very fun but challenging to try and figure out how to get some of the sheets of metal wider than the path we had down to the dumpster. After we finished that, some of the moms and kids there planted trees out front, while the others lugged 80-pound bags of concrete up to the top of the farm. We had a cement mixer up there, and we filled in one of the hollow walls of the future goat barn with concrete. There were a few jobs that people were doing. Some were dumping dry concrete into the mixer, a few were spraying water into the mixer, one person was turning the mixer on and off, some people were shoveling wet concrete into the wall, and finally, some were either poking the concrete to settle it, or hitting the wall with a hammer to do the same thing. Healthy Salad Recipe

As the Healthy Living Officer for our club I am supposed to share healthy recipes with the people in the club. Because Thanksgiving is coming up soon I decided to share a recipe that you could serve with the turkey and stuffing.

In my family we eat a lot of salad and we have figured out a generic salad recipe. It is very simple and can be easily modified.

For this Salad:

- Choose One Type of Lettuce
 - Spring Mix
 - Romaine
 - Arugula
 - Spinach
 - or mix
- Choose One Fruit
 - Apples
 - Pears
 - Persimmons
 - Beets
 - Strawberries
 - Etc.
- Choose One Nut
 - Toasted pecans
 - Walnuts
 - Pistachios
 - Etc.



- ~Optional~ Choose One Dried Fruit
 - Cranberries
 - Blueberries
 - Cherries
 - Etc.
- Choose One Cheese
 - Parmesan
 - Goat
 - Feta
 - Blue
 - Gorgonzola
 - Etc.
- Dressing: White Balsamic Vinegar, Walnut Oil (or other oil: Olive Oil, Pecan Oil, Pumpkin Seed Oil, etc.) Salt, Pepper

Mix all ingredients in a bowl. For dressing put equal parts oil and vinegar in a jar. Add salt and pepper. Shake well to combine. Pour dressing over salad and enjoy!

Some of our favorite combinations are:

- Apple. Pecan, and Parmesan
- Persimmon, Pistachio, and Goat Cheese
- Strawberry, Walnut, and Feta
- Beet, Pecan, and Goat Cheese
- Pear, Pecan, and Blue Cheese
