Member Reports

Lamb Project

On March 31st, I went to pre-fair check-in. Before we got there, we had to find a trailer to bring the lambs to the fairgrounds. We ended up borrowing the Nielsen's trailer to bring them there. Before we left I gave my lamb probiotics to make sure he stayed healthy through the whole trip. When we got to the fairgrounds, there was a long line to see Dr. Seals (the pre-fair check-in vet). We got them out of the trailer and brought them in a line near the shade. When it was my turn in line, I went up and the vet checked my lamb. One thing they check for is the length of the dock. Since the vet doesn't have an x-ray machine to check the vertebrae, he just makes sure it is liftable. Last year, my lamb almost didn't make it into fair so I didn't want to repeat that experience. If they don't get into fair you have to find a new lamb to bring. He ended up making it in though so I was excited I didn't have to get a new lamb. He got an orange ear tag so he can come back when the fair is ready to start. I'm so excited to go to fair and this experience is leading up to that! --Peyton Steitz

On the 28th of April I shaved my goat with the help of the leader of the Goat Project, Danielle. We use normal dog clippers to shave our goats, but because goats have so much skin, we have to stretch out the skin so that it does not have wrinkles. We also "blend" their legs so that we can make them look fluffy for the goat show at the County Fair. --Aaron Larson
